Students Asked, We Acted Rx for Success – Clerkship Edition

The first *Rx for Success: Clerkship Edition* was held on Friday, June 27, supporting rising third-year medical students as they transition into the clerkship phase of the curriculum. This program was developed in response to student feedback from the Student Subcommittee of the Curriculum Committee and created through collaboration among Division of Medical Education, Whiddon COM Simulation Program, Office of Accreditation and Planning (OAP), and Student Affairs.

Participants engaged in interactive sessions to apply learning science, develop self-management strategies, and practice key clinical skills. Rising M4 students assisted faculty facilitators and offered practical insights from their own clerkship experiences.
